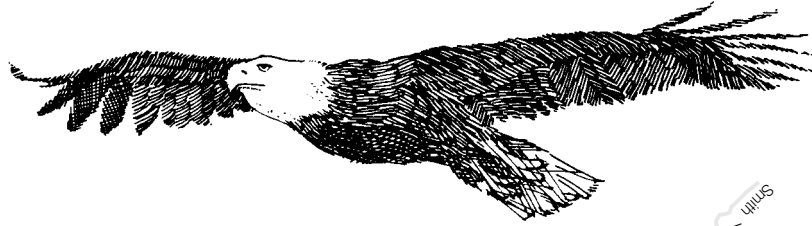




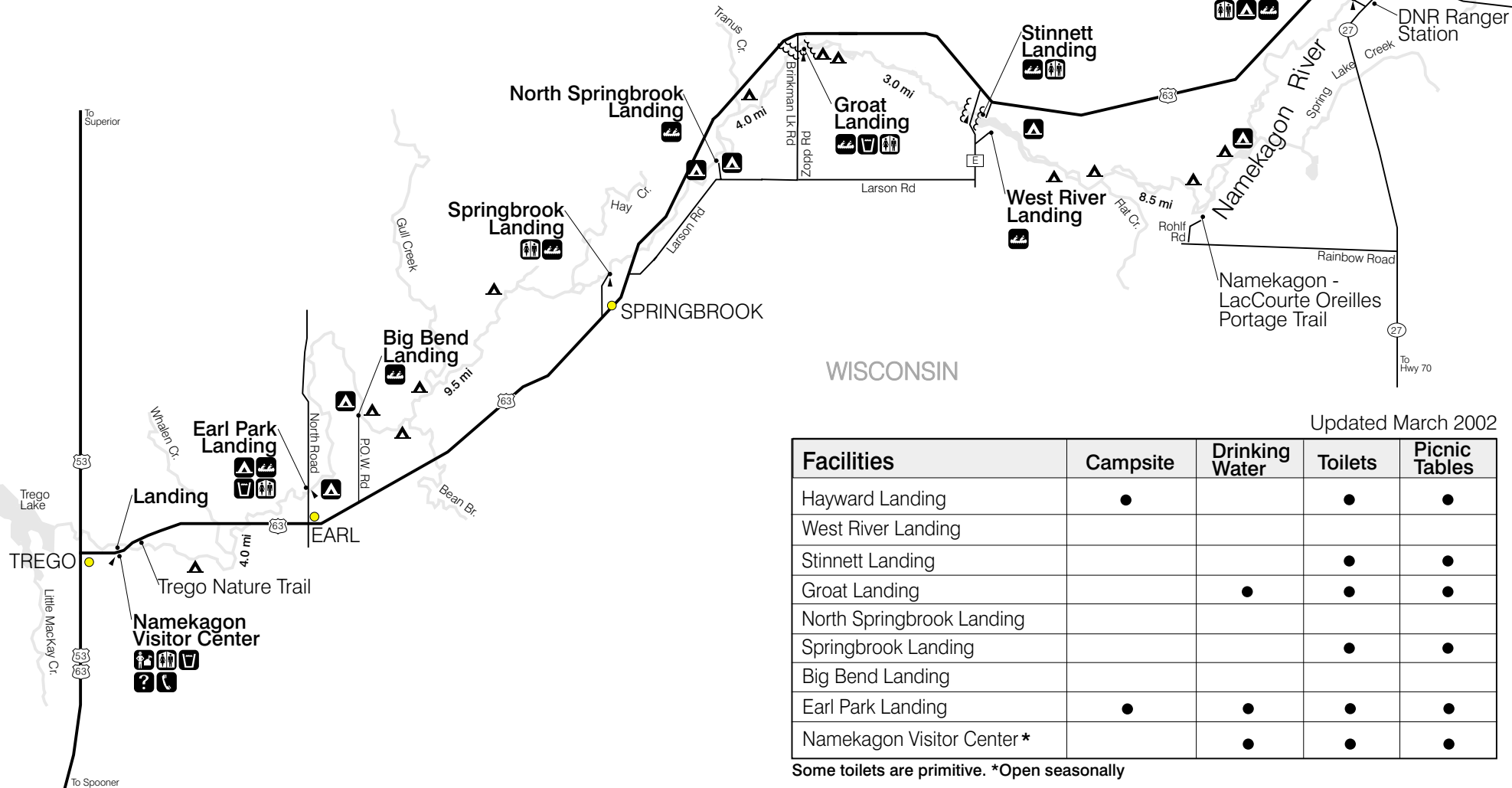

The Namekagon River between Hayward and Trego offers good canoeing and tubing except in extreme drought. Class I and II rapids exist immediately after Stinnett and Groat Landings. Watch for rocks and other obstacles in these areas. Telephones, food and restrooms are available in towns located along the river. Water is also available at the DNR Ranger Station, Monday through Friday, 7:45 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. near Hayward. Several private fee campgrounds, accessible from the water, are located between the Namekagon Visitor Center and Trego Dam. Jumping from bridges, trees or cliffs is prohibited.

International Scale of River Difficulty
Class I: Moving water with few riffles and small waves. Few or no obstacles.
Class II: Easy rapids with waves up to three feet, and wide channels. Some maneuvering is required.

Distance Between Locations
 Example: To find the distance between Earl Park Landing and Stinnett Landing, move vertically down from Stinnett Landing and move horizontally left from Earl Park Landing. You should arrive at the square reading 16.5 miles.
